### Eligibility Criteria for Startups

To be recognized officially as a startup in India, an entity will have to fulfill the following:

Incorporated as One Person Company, Private Limited Company, LLP, or Partnership Firm.

Not older than 10 years from the incorporation date.

Turnover is not more than INR 100 crore in any single financial year.

Emphasis on product development, process development, or product improvement.

Not formed through the division or reconstruction of a going concern.

Certified by the Inter-Ministerial Board for startup recognition.

### Registration and DPIIT Recognition

#### Incorporation

Register as a Private Limited Company, LLP, or Partnership Firm under the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) portal. Obtain PAN, TAN, and industry-specific licenses (e.g., GST, FSSAI, Shop Establishment). Startup India and DPIIT Recognition Register on the Startup India portal and seek DPIIT recognition. Submit documents like the certificate of incorporation, proof of concept, and innovation details. Self-certify the eligibility conditions (age, turnover, innovation, etc.). On approval, a recognition number and certificate are issued, enabling diverse benefits.

#### Legal Compliance Checklist

Startups have to comply with various legal requirements, such as:

Business registration and choice of structure

Tax registrations: GST, PAN, TAN

Labour law compliance: ESIC, EPF, Shops and Establishments Act

Environmental and industry legislation

Periodic statutory filings and annual returns

POSH (Prevention of Sexual Harassment) compliance

Contract drafting and review

##### Startup India Initiative

Introduced in 2016, the flagship program provides:

Self-certification for 6 labor and 3 environmental laws. 3-year income tax exemption during the first 10 years (Section 80-IAC). Quick patent application with an 80% fee concession. Simplified winding up within 90 days under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code. Easy access to government procurement through GeM. Startup India Seed Fund Scheme (SISFS) Seed funding up to ₹20 lakh for proof of concept and up to ₹50 lakh for market entry and scaling, through chosen incubators. PAN-India, sector-agnostic, and no physical incubation required.

##### Intellectual Property Protection

SIPP (Scheme for Facilitating Start-Ups Intellectual Property Protection): Offers assistance for patent, trademark, and design protection with lower fees and government-appointed facilitators. WIPO Technology and Innovation Support Centers: Assist startups in developing, securing, and maintaining IPRs.

##### Compliance and Risk Management

Non-compliance may lead to fines, delays, and loss of investor trust. Legal audits at regular intervals, diligent contract management, and current filings are a must.

Recognition by DPIIT also ensures Angel Tax relief and faster funding access.
